
2016 Christmas Party

Start The New Year With An Annual Medical



The Kamares Medical Centre offers its members an annual medical for only €102, this entails the following:

Urine specimen

Women - Mammogram

Men PSA level checked for Prostate Enlargement

Chest X-Ray

Bloods

The above tests are conducted at the Iasis Hospital and usually the results are ready the same day in the afternoon.

The patient collects the results and returns to Kamares Medical Centre for consultation with the Doctor who will discuss any findings with the patient.

This will be followed by:

ECG

Blood Pressure check etc

Women have the option to have an ultrasound of the breast instead of a Mammogram but there is an extra charge of €45.

Patients wishing to take up this offer should first visit the Kamares Centre and the nurse will make the appointment for the Mammogram. Alternatively patients can go direct to the Iasis stating they have come for their annual medical from Kamares.

The patient pays at the Iasis reception either by card, cash or cheque and must produce the invoice or receipt at Kamares when having their consultation.

Sally: Everybody's Pet

Most people using the club or clinic are very familiar with Sally the lovely cross Terrier who runs around between the two facilities. Everybody seems to pet her and feed her titbits from their meals at the club. She actually lives at the Medical Centre and has a cosy kennel with mattress and blankets on the patio. I often get asked how old she is as she is now greying around the ears and jowls. We estimate that she is around 11 years old.

She came to the clinic within the first few months of the clinic opening in 2007 and she was then a very bouncy young pup. Sally was brought to the clinic by one of the Leptos gardeners who apparently rescued her from his neighbour who was about to dispose of her! The nurses fell in love with her and wanted to keep her. We were not sure how this would work and there was the matter of feeding and vet fees etc. Needless to say she stayed and plans had to be put into place for her well being.



The first thing was to have her neutered for obvious reasons and a little fund was set up in the library to help with the rest of her care. However, Bill and I oversee her general wellbeing and supplement any short falls as there is not always enough for vet fees but people are very generous.

One day a beautiful little kitten appeared at the clinic, an obvious stray or a 'drop off'. Sally took this little kitten under her wing and they became firm companions, we called this kitten Harry. He thrived under Sally's care and grew to be a beautiful cat and was as popular with residents as Sally. To see them play, eat and sleep together was a joy and they were together for several years.

Unfortunately one day it was apparent that Harry was not very well and was having trouble breathing. A visit to the vet resulted in him having to be kept in as they discovered his lungs were full of fluid and he was also a chronic diabetic. After 10 days of intensive treatment the vet recommended he be put to sleep as he would not survive and would die in pain. This was the most terrible decision we have had to make but we had to follow the vets advice. For a while Sally looked a bit lost and was obviously missing him terribly. However, Dr.Pradeep brought another sweet stray cat from the Iasis hospital as a replacement friend. She is called Lisa and again because of Sally's gentle nature they have become firm friends.

We take Sally on regular walks and she loves riding in the car. We just hope we will have her with us for many more years as she gives such pleasure to everyone particularly children.

Pafos 2017

Paphos, along with the Danish town of Aarhus, is now the European Capitals of Culture for 2017.

Pafos 2017's mission "is to send the message to all European countries and in the Middle East, which in recent years is suffering from wars, conflicts and a serious humanitarian crisis, that the values

of humanism and culture should prevail," Mayor Phedonos said.

The cultural programme will officially begin on January 21 in Aarhus, while the opening ceremony for Pafos 2017 will take place on January 28 and will be attended by EU Commissioner for Humanitarian Aid and Crisis Management Christos Stylianides, and President Nicos Anastasiades.

The opening ceremony for Pafos 2017, which is inspired by one of the themes for the year's cultural programme 'Myth and Religion', was designed by a team of Cypriot artists in cooperation with the group Walk the Plank. It aims to illustrate the history, multiculturalism and contemporary culture of Paphos as an integral part of the broader European civilisation.

The event is inspired by the legend of Paphos which centred on the myth of Pygmalion and Galatea. Pygmalion was a mythical king of Cyprus and a sculptor. He carved an exquisite statue, Galatea, with whom he fell in love and when he kissed her she came to life. According to the legend, they had a child after their union was blessed by Aphrodite. They named the child Paphos, and the city where the mythical couple is said to have lived is named after the couple's offspring.

Hundreds of professionals from around the island, organised groups, volunteers, students and young children will take part. As part of the programme, Greek Cypriot and Turkish musicians and singers will join in as well as a jazz orchestra from Aarhus.

The opening ceremony will also include a spectacle of lights and sound, while Greek singer Alkistis Protopsalti and other artists will have a central role in the ceremony.

Did You Know?



Cyprus' famous Brandy Sour cocktail was developed following the introduction of the first blended brandy, by the Haggipavlu family in the early 1930s. It was created at the Forest Park Hotel in Platres for the young King Farouk of Egypt who often stayed at the hotel during his frequent visits to the island. It was introduced as an alcoholic substitute for iced tea as a way of disguising the Muslim monarch's preference for Western-style cocktails.

Ancient Ramparts Found

Archaeological excavations in Kouklia in 2016 have revealed, among others, an ancient rampart dating as far back as 6th century BC. The Department of Antiquities of Cyprus has announced the completion of the University of Cyprus 2016 field project in the economic-administrative citadel of Ancient Paphos at Kouklia, under the direction of Professor Maria Iacovou. The 2016 excavations were conducted in two phases between May and October on the plateau (citadel) of Hadjiabdoulla, which houses an extensive storage-plus-industrial complex of the Cypro-Classical



period, and on the nearby impressive man-made mount of Laona, the press release says.

Both monuments were unknown prior to the initiation of the Palaepaphos landscape analysis project (2006-2016) by Professor Maria Iacovou. It is thought that the plateau of Hadjiabdoulla, located east of the sanctuary of Aphrodite, functioned "as the centre of the royal dynasty that ruled the city-state of Paphos until the end of the 4th century BC." The stone-built complex under investigation extends over 65 m. along the plateau's northern edge. "It consists of stepped terraces built down the slope; it is subdivided into production and storage units by means of long cross-walls and parallel retaining walls," the press release reads.
