UK EXPAT LIVING IN CYPRUS PERMANENTLY? YOU NEED TO FORMALISE YOUR RESIDENCY

At the current time, from 1 January 2021, UK expats will cease to be European citizens and will become third country nationals. From 1 January 2021, it is expected that the residency process in Cyprus will become more stringent. Further, the Cyprus Government will now only recognise MEU1 and MEU3 for residency purposes - any older forms or stamps of 'permanent residency' are no longer valid.

Due to the loss of European citizenship, without the necessary paperwork, you will only be able to stay in Cyprus for up to 90 days and will not then be able to return for another 90 days. Without the official paperwork, you are also leaving yourself open to a large fine, and are unlikely to be able to join GESY, the Cyprus National Health Scheme. You will already have seen that when the airports in Cyprus closed, the Government made it clear that they would repatriate Cypriots and those with permanent residency - this has meant that many expats are stranded in the UK and cannot return until flights resume as they do not have any paperwork confirming their residency and thus do not qualify for repatriation.

It is therefore essential that you formalise your stay in Cyprus without further delay and obtain your MEU1 [if you have not lived in Cyprus for 5 years] or your MEU3 [if you have lived here for more than 5 years]. If you have been here for more than 5 years and have supporting documentation, please tell Immigration that you wish to go straight for your MEU3.

Government departments started returning to 'normal' the week commencing 4 May. Once lockdown is lifted [estimated to be 21 May], as a first step you should go down to the Immigration Department with your passport[s] to make an appointment. Immigration will give you a slip of paper confirming the documentation you will need to take with you to that appointment. Expect to have to wait 3 or 4 months for the appointment - although you may be lucky and a cancellation slot could be available.

If you are elderly or disabled, daunted by the process, help is available via CRPG, a free service. They will discuss your application with you, talk you through the documentation you need to be assembling and are currently compiling a list of those to help so that they can be ready to start the process with you once lockdown is lifted.

MEU1- Registration Certificate: (after 90 days) will need a completed application form, passport, proof of residence, letter from employer or self employed certificate of registration, three months social insurance certificate, for retired or unemployed, a P60, pension, or bank statements showing sufficient resources, and S1 or personal health insurance, current bank statement, two passport photographs, and €20 cash.

MEU3 – Permanent Residence - (after five years) will need an MEU1, passport, Cyprus IDs, if any, marriage or death certificate, title deed of house or rental contacts, electricity bills for five years, five years of bank statements, social insurance payments for five years (if applicable), and two photographs and €20 cash.

If you are not married and living with a partner and have no utility bills with your name, you are required to have a letter signed by you and your partner stating that you live at that address and date you lived there from e.g.

We will continue to try and achieve this so she can join her male friend and I'm sure you remember the male hound that used to accompany her around the village, this dog is now at PAWS and is doing extremely well and has adjusted to life in the Shelter, enjoying his fuss and attention. You may not have been aware but this dog is totally blind and relied on Hattie to keep him safe....what an incredible little lady she is! We will keep you updated if we are successful in her capture.

Off the Beaten Track – ASPROGIA

Asprogia is a village in the Paphos district situated in the southwest Troodos mountain range; it is only 30 kms away from the centre of Paphos and 17kms away from Kykkos Monastery. On the main road, before turning up into the village, there is also a mosque.

It is a small village and manages to retain its traditional character The dam of Asprogia-Kannaviou is maybe the prettiest in Cyprus and looks like a natural lake.

The main church of the village is dedicated to Saint Epiphanius and dates back to the 18th century. In Asprogia you can also find the cave of Saint Agios Sozontos, a local saint, who according to the legend did many miracles and was killed in this cave during the time that Christians were persecuted for their religious beliefs. To find this, walk down behind the mosque. A new church is also being built there.

STRAWBERRIES

Did you know.... Strawberries are the only fruit that wear their seeds on the outside - no wonder it only takes one bite to get seeds stuck in your teeth. Strawberries aren't true berries, like blueberries or even grapes. Technically, a berry has its seeds on the inside.

The rose family is arguably one of the six most economically important crop plant families, and includes apples, pears, quinces, medlars, loquats, almonds, peaches, apricots, plums, cherries, strawberries, blackberries, raspberries, sloes, and roses among the crop plants belonging to the family.

Why are strawberries part of the rose family?

Because both strawberries and apples have the same flower structure. Flowers of plants in the rose family are actinomorphic (symmetrical) and almost always hermaphroditic. The bases of the sepals, petals, and stamens are fused together and form a characteristic cup-like structure called a hypanthium.
