

Whilst we are just about recovering from the Kamares fires of June this year, this is a gentle reminder that at this time of year we could all make a difference, in replacing some of what we have lost. If everybody planted just one shrub or tree what a difference this could make in a short time.

The winter season is coming and rains will soon arrive, so anything planted now stands a good chance of standing on its own roots next year!! If you cannot get a water supply to any plant it will have this winter to settle. There are plenty of indigenous plants that grow in wild places that need little water. One person one tree probably won't make much impact on our surroundings, but many will.

The areas around us are burnt to a crisp and I cannot see any objection to any of us planting some tree or bush somewhere nearby to where we live. Scrubland will reappear eventually but how nice to see something special mixed in. Yes there may be more fires to come but hopefully not. Meanwhile the birds can nest, in 'our' trees and shrubs and we can all sit back proud we at least tried to make a difference. Most of us were lucky enough to have kept our gardens, but acres of land in Kamares were destroyed. Many trees survive (including fruit) without water in Cyprus and I am sure gardening centres would give advice. Take a chance on a fig or olive tree; I have even seen kumquats in the middle of nowhere (a cold-hardy tree) baring fruit. Oleander too, and bougainvillea thrive in desert conditions, one could just put a root cutting in at this time of year, costing nothing with fingers crossed!

As we pass in years to come, what a thrill to see our thoughts and efforts rewarded. Of course some will fail, but not all.



Emergency Medical Centre

Winter influenza vaccines are now available. If you wish to have the vaccine, please call or visit the Centre to add your name and telephone number to the list. You will be notified once they are available.

Dr. Pradeep will be available on **Tuesday and Thursday** mornings only, from 10:00a.m.-1:00p.m. for consultations.

As you know Dr. Pradeep is a GESY registered doctor. If you wish to register with him, or need a medical consultation, you

must make an appointment with the reception on 26653328.

Due to the Coronavirus restrictions the following information remains current:

The Medical Centre is open from 7:00a.m.-7:00p.m. Monday - Friday.

Closed Saturday afternoon from 1:00p.m. and all day Sunday.

Doctor Sylvia is available Monday, Wednesday and Friday Mornings from 9:00a.m. - 12noon.

When visiting the Medical Centre it is mandatory to wear face masks and only **one** person is allowed into the reception at any one time to avoid infection.

Appointments should be made for a consultation with the Doctor with exemptions for emergencies.

BLOOD TESTS

For patients who need to have blood tests, these can now be taken at the medical centre each week on Thursdays. Please call to make an appointment. This can be done under the GESY system.

Covid Tests

Rapid Covid tests are available at the Medical Centre

<u>Appointments must be made for this service.</u> The results will be immediate – a charge of €20 for this service.

FURTHER SERVICES

A Dietician will be introduced one day a week.

Home visits by a nurse for injections, change of dressings etc will be introduced if there is a demand for this service.

Mobility aids are available for a small fee ie crutches, toilet seat etc.

You will be informed of any updates on the above.
